Residents of Halfway Houses, Transition Centers, and other DOJ Supervised Community Residential Facilities are sometimes denied Medicaid due to incorrectly being considered an inmate. Such facilities can be publicly or privately operated and often house individuals with a variety of justice system statuses. They are not public institutions but do often have house rules that require residents to return at night.

It is important to gather more information about the facility and the individual's justice system status prior to determining if an applicant is ineligible due to incarceration.

- A resident of one of these facilities who is on parole or probation is **not an inmate**. Example: Clackamas County Residential Center requires its residents to be on parole or probation before entering their facility. None of their residents are considered inmates.
- A resident who is on work-release and works during the day but is required to return to the residential facility at night due to curfew is **not an inmate** because they are not returning to a public institution.

- An individual who is court ordered to reside in one of these facilities is considered an **inmate**.
 - Exception: Those court ordered to reside in <u>Northwest Regional Reentry</u> <u>Center</u> for community restoration (referred to as the Aid & Assist or 370 population) are **not inmates**.
